TLC Assemblies







In term 4, we have been focusing on our school value of kindness. Last Friday, we came together as a school to support local charities and initiatives that seek to address key issues within our local community. Each Teaching Learning Community (TLC) took ownership of a particular charity or cause. Rainforest spent the morning working in our Forest School, planting wildflowers as well as building bug hotels. This was to support insect species that are endangered within Kent and to encourage our pupils to recognise our responsibility in caring for the environment. Desert spent the morning learning about the difficulties that homeless people face on the streets of Canterbury and what we can do as a school to show kindness to individuals who are experiencing this predicament. Abbie, from Porch Light, came and spoke to the children about these issues and we then designed socks with fabric pens, which will be distributed to homeless people by Porch Light next winter on our behalf. Savannah spent the morning with a representative from the charity Kent Kindness, which works to provide initial support to unaccompanied children seeking refuge. She spoke about some of the common experiences that many of these children face. They then spent the morning focussing on empathy and compassion through PSHE and craft activities. Finally, Marine were busy creating Spring cards for a local nursing home that we have linked with. Next term, we have arranged to visit the home to entertain the elderly residents with some musical performances. The children thoroughly enjoyed the morning and used kindness and creativity to help people belong in our school, community and environment.









Last Friday (21st March), Cheetah Class ran a fantastic fundraising event to raise money for Comic Relief. Over the week leading up to Red Nose Day, they sold red noses to the rest of the school, which were a real hit! The day itself began with Cheetah Class doing an assembly, where they explained the purpose of Comic Relief, as well as showcasing 40 years of red noses! They also held a cake sale at break time, which again proved to be very popular. Thank you to all of the parents that helped with this by making delicious cakes and biscuits for us to sell. In total, as a school, we raised a wonderful £406 for Comic




