How is No Outsiders used at SSJS?

We use content from Andrew Moffat's book 'No Outsiders: Everyone Different, Everyone Welcome, Preparing Children for Life in Modern Britain.' This is in the form of assemblies and high-quality age-related texts and activities. These enable us to explore key themes of diversity and inclusion with children in ways that are engaging and at an appropriate developmental level for both understanding and application.

Differences make each of us special and unique and this is a wonderful and powerful message that will prepare all of our children for each day in our school but for the future too. We want every child in our school to see difference in themselves and others as something valuable and special. With our school values centered around belonging and a broad and balanced curriculum to support us as a large and inclusive school, the 'No Outsiders' message has resonated with pupils ... we all have the right to feel welcome and included and nobody should be made to feel like an outsider.

How does this link with our PSHE curriculum?

As per our PSHE policy, we use elements of the No Outsiders curriculum based on suitability and appropriateness alongside our chosen PSHE scheme, Jigsaw. Any materials used are reviewed alongside these curriculum requirements and the aims and values of our school. We select materials from 'No Outsiders' which are in line with the national guidance provided by the DfE on what is appropriate for this age range*.

What material is specifically used and how?

Assemblies and texts that have been selected tackle themes such as racism, bring challenge to lack of tolerance or stereotypical thinking and encourage children to ask questions about differences with a view to celebrating these and learning from them.
